NOTIONAL TIMELINE TO DEPLOY OF BOSNIA PEACE IMPLEMENTATION FORCE (IFOR)

TIME

ACTION (All actions/dates still being finalized by NATO)

Now

Assessment/Survey Team already in country.

Possibly as early as this weekend

Enabling Force of as many as 3,500 NATO troops (400-1,000 U.S.) goes in to prepare for arrival of combat units; Enabling force includes port handlers, communicators, and other Combat Service Support elements, and will bring with it some self-protection capability; deployment requires a Presidential decision and depends on whether the NATO Military Committee finalizes plans today/tomorrow to permit the North Atlantic Council to approve them by Friday.

Enabling Force will set up sector headquarters, possibly in Sarajevo, Tuzla, and Vakuf.

December 9-11

Administration's hoped-for period of Congressional deliberations to authorize/approve U.S. participation in IFOR.

December 11-19

Window for Paris Peace Conference to sign treaty; French will decide dates, but U.S. expects the signing about December 17.

Day after Treaty signing

IFOR begins deployment (U.S. participation depends on Congress's actions re: restricting funds, another CR, etc.).

Within first 96 hours after Treaty signing

NATO Command element sets up in country and UN Protection Force (UNPROFOR) comes under IFOR control.

Days 10-14

First U.S. brigade could deploy into Tuzla in northeast Bosnia.

30-90 days after Treaty signing

IFOR deployment completes. Pace of deployment will depend on many factors, not the least of which will be the weather.

If U.S. participation occurs, most American troops will come from Europe, including reserves if decision is made to call them up.

For IFOR purposes, Bosnia will be divided into at least three sectors. Specific nations may be assigned primary responsibilities as follows:

U.S. and Russia - northeast Bosnia, inc. Tuzla and Brcko Corridor; France - Sarajevo and southeast Bosnia; UK - central/middle Bosnia.
